Two consecutive days of updates...feels a little like it did over the summer as PPP was being rolled out.

Late last night I received some communication regarding the additional data being released by SBA for PPP and EIDL. This is National news so many of you likely have already seen, but the below (which I copy/paste information I received on PPP/EIDL) contains a website link for corrections on PPP and email address to report mistakes for EIDL which may be useful and attached Data Key Aspects for additional information.

- **Tonight, SBA is providing information on Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans, Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL), and Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) Advances in an effort to keep the public informed of the assistance and actions that the agency and thousands of lenders across the country are taking at this difficult time.**

 - SBA is doing this because it is adhering to a court order dictating that detailed information about recipients of PPP and EIDL assistance must be provided.
 - The answer to someone asking about incorrect PPP information released about them is to direct them to this link (<https://www.sba.gov/ppp-data-feedback>) which will allow them to update or correct their information. Also attached is some key aspects of the PPP loan data released.

Manufacturing Update: Alistair Stewart

- Heightened attention to keeping COVID out of the workplace (mandatory mask wearing, mandatory and increased distancing, facilities closed to non-employees, etc.)
- More workforce stress and unavailability due to increased childcare shortages/daycare closures
- Manufacturers with strong demand and sales continue to see backlogs growing, and increased workforce shortages
- A number of manufacturers are actively increasing wages, and plan to be above DLI-reported parity
- Supply chain disruption continues to adversely impact production
- MMEC has grant money available to help manufacturers adversely impacted by COVID
