Gallatin County 1B Vaccination Sign Up Available Friday 2/5 at noon. Update on Gallatin County Emergency Public Health Rules



COMING SOON: Sign-Ups for Phase 1B

A limited number of COVID-19 vaccine online sign-ups for those eligible in Phase 1A or Phase 1B will be available on:

Friday, Feb. 5 starting at 12 PM (noon) – Check back here for a live link when the sign-ups are open.

PLEASE NOTE: You will have to fill out forms through the live link BEFORE your appointment is finalized. And regardless if you have insurance or not, you MUST select the “no insurance” option to move through the sign-up process. You will NOT be billed for the vaccine from this clinic. Ignore the statement on the link that mentions insurance.

Reopening Gallatin County

The Gallatin City-County Board of Health voted on February 4, 2021 to extend the current emergency public health rule that places operating restrictions on certain businesses in order to slow the spread of COVID-19. The new rule included an amendment allowing bars, restaurants, and other licensed food and beverage establishments to operate until 2:00 a.m.

*****Until the Board of Health votes to lift these more protective measures, all public health rules are still in effect in Gallatin County.*****

- Face coverings must be worn in all public places regardless of the number of cases in the county.

- If you have a higher risk of complications from COVID-19, you should continue to follow [stay-at-home guidance](#).
- All restaurants, bars, breweries, distilleries, and casinos should have no more than 50% capacity and close by 2:00 a.m.
- All eating and drinking establishments should limit group sizes at tables to 6 or less.
- All public gatherings should be limited to 25 people or less. All private gatherings should be limited to 15 people or less.

As part of the state's reopening plan, local jurisdictions are allowed to make adjustments and implement more strict measures in order to help prevent further spread. See the latest announcement on [February 4, 2021 from the Gallatin City-County Board of Health](#).
